Casmer W. Isabell 1924 to 1997

Funeral services for Casmer W. Isabell, 72, ¹⁻¹⁸⁻¹⁹⁹⁷ were held Tuesday, January 21, 1997, at the First Christian Church. Pastor Gordon Swedberg officiated.

Interment for Mr. Isabell will be held on Thursday, January 23, 1997, at 10:00 a.m. in the Wheatland Cemetery.

Mr. Isabell died Saturday, January 18, 1997 at the Platte County Memorial Hospital in Wheatland.

He was born November 1, 1924 in Wheatland, the son of Samuel and Ethel (Titus) Isabell. Casmer was raised and educated in Wheatland, graduating from Wheatland High School in 1943. He entered the U.S. Air Force, serving during World War II in the Pacific Theatre until 1945. When he returned to Wheatland in December of 1945, he began his banking career with First State Bank, working for Andy Kendig—the bank is now Norwest Bank. Casmer retired in 1989 as vice-president of the bank.

He married Doris J. Hopper on June 12, 1946 in Gering, Nebraska. He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows Lodge, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Moose Lodge, past member of the Lion's Club, treasurer of the Platte County Memorial Hospital Board, and a member of the United Church of Christ. He enjoyed reading to the utmost.

Casmer is survived by his wife Doris of Wheatland, two children, Sharon Isabell of Lander, Wyoming; and Gregg Isabell of Wyoming; three sisters, Pearl Lawrence of Wheatland, Lillian Krewer of Cheyenne; and Delores Christensen of Bozeman, Montana; seven grandchildren; three great grandchildren and numerous nieces, nephews, and many, many friends.

He was preceded in death by his parents; three brothers and four sisters.
