**PIONEER RESIDENT PASSES AWAY.**

**Mrs. Colin MacDougall Dies at Her Home in This City After Few Days Illness.**

A gloom was cast over the entire community on Sunday morning when word was passed around town that Mrs. Colin MacDougall had passed away early in the morning. Mrs. MacDougall had been sick only a few days from an attack of pneumonia, and news of her death was a surprise to everyone.

Mrs. Rachael MacDougall was born in Canada, September 22, 1849. She was married to Colin MacDougall in 1874, and moved to this country in 1881. They lived on their ranch on Reshaw until two years ago when they moved into town. There are four children who survive her, three boys and one daughter as follows: G.D. MacDougall, Henry MacDougall, and Miss Katherine MacDougall of Wheatland, and A.H. MacDougall, of Torrington.

She departed this life on the first day of May 1910, aged 60 years, 9 months and 9 days.

She was a member of the Baptist Church and her sterling worth and sweet Christian character were such that she endeared herself to all who came in contact with her. She was a member of the Eastern Star, and she will be missed from the many circles where she was in the habit of attending. Her life was one that had its trust in God and the Bible, and in the Christ who was and is her redeemer. Her supreme love of her home and those whom God had given her caused her to lose self for their comfort and welfare. Her death was such an one as might be expected of any one who had lived as she had done. It was as beautiful as her life, and the Spirit went out of the body in perfect hope and trust in her Lord.

The funeral services were held Tuesday at the Christian church, conducted by Rev. Gilmore of the Congregational church. The church was crowded to the doors by the friends of the deceased, and the members of the Eastern Star order attended in a body as did also members of the Masonic order.

The casket was covered with many beautiful flowers and wreaths, which were furnished by friends of the deceased.

Interment took place in the Wheatland cemetery, the funeral procession being the largest ever witnessed in this section.

The bereaved husband and family have the heartfelt sympathy of everyone in their affliction.
